Agenda Item: Dog Park Fence

Request:

Staff requests OSRAC feedback on preferred concepts, key considerations, and any red flags before staff refines cost estimates for fencing the dog park in early 2026.

Background:

The Eagle Dog Park fencing project has been under consideration for several years, and the concept has previously been reviewed by Town Council. In an earlier discussion, Council supported the idea of installing perimeter fencing at the dog park and passed a motion directing staff to move forward with planning and design. At that time, preliminary funding was included in the 2025 Capital Improvement Plan, supported by the Town's Sales Tax Capital Improvement Fund.

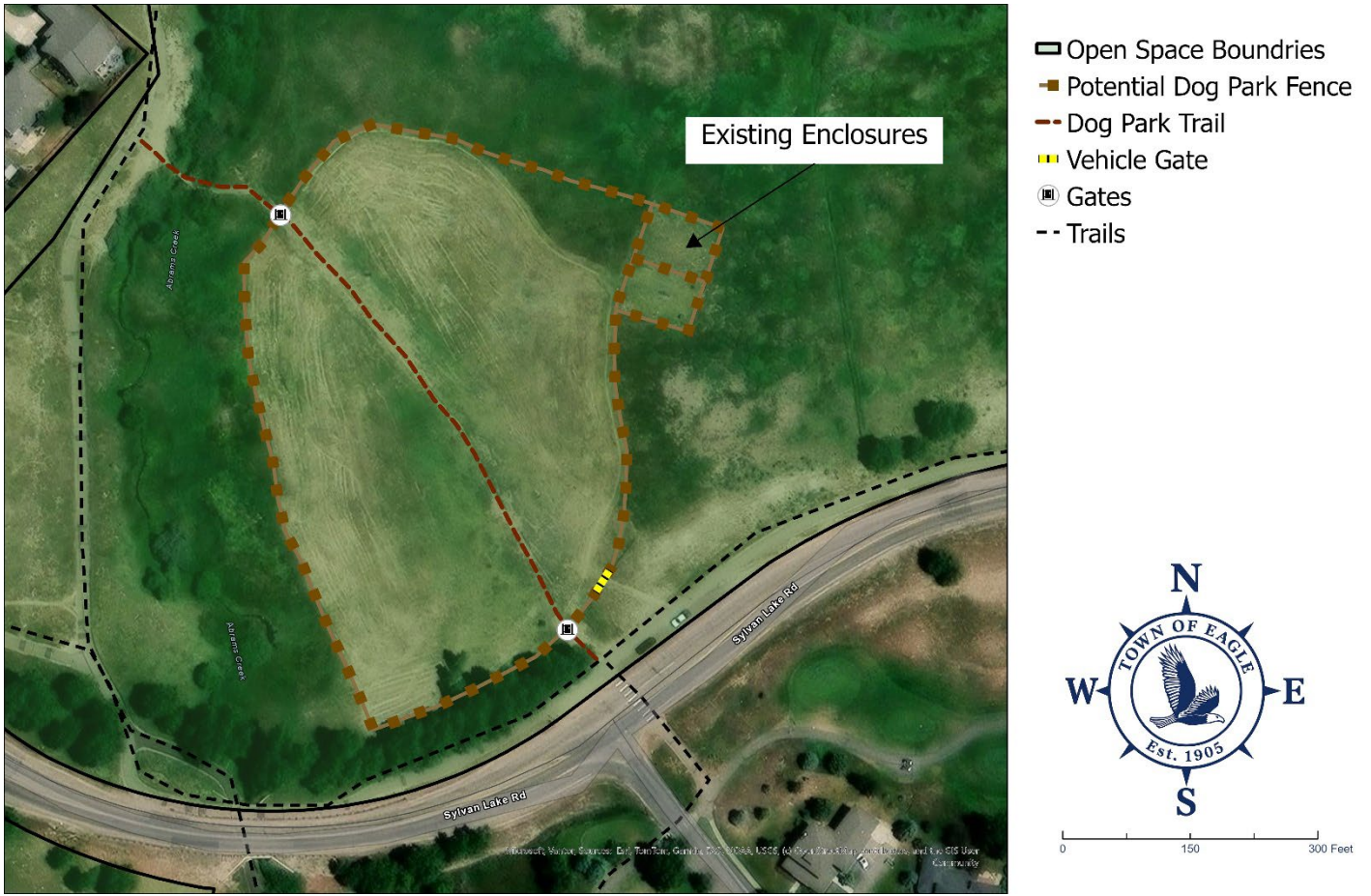
Following Council's later decision to prioritize funding for the Rodeo Rink project, the dog park fence allocation was temporarily redirected. However, the project has since been reinstated and funded in the 2026 Capital Improvement budget, again using the Sales Tax Capital Improvement Fund. \$45,000 is available for design and construction.

The intent of bringing this item to OSRAC is not to revisit the question of *whether* to install fencing—Council has already provided direction on that point. Rather, staff is seeking committee feedback on design concepts, priorities, and tradeoffs to ensure the project reflects community needs and open-space values before staff refines cost estimates and moves forward with construction.

Analysis:

- Location:
 - The Dog park is located along Sylvan Lake Road by the junction with Lime Park Drive, North of the Eagle Ranch Golf Course Clubhouse.
- Scope:
 - The final size of the dog park is yet to be determined.
 - One option is to fence the current extent of the area that is currently mowed (see map).
 - This design would call for roughly 1,400 feet of new fence construction.
 - The enclosed area would be just over 3 acres.

- Design calls for two entrance gates, and 1 vehicle sized gate for maintenance purposes.



- Fence type under consideration- Dowel Rail with 4" welded galvanized wire mesh.



Key considerations:

- 1) Double gate (airlock) entrances
 - a. Double gates improve safety by preventing accidental escapes during busy periods.



b. Should staff prioritize including double gates at both entrances?

- 2) Separate small-dog and large-dog areas.



- a. Some dog parks include designated areas for small dogs. This can improve user experience in certain communities. But also,
 - i. Increase construction costs
 - ii. Reduces usable size for each individual area

- iii. May not be necessary given current use at the park
 - iv. The existing small fenced and agility areas will remain and could be sufficient.
 - b. Staff recommends that we defer this decision until a need is demonstrated
 - i. A potential location for future separation could be identified
 - ii. *What are the committee's thoughts on separating large dog and small dog areas?*
- 3) Existing Trail Improvements
 - a. There is a well-worn natural surface trail that cuts across the park.
 - i. Continued use may lead to further erosion and degradation of the trail
 - ii. *Should improving the trail (e.g. crusher fines) be a priority for future trail improvement projects?*
- 4) Other amenities
 - a. Earlier plans mention potential trash cans, parking lot, shade structures, etc.
 - b. Current plans would not preclude any future developments but
 - i. *Are there any amenities staff should consider for future development or prioritize in this phase?*
- 5) Fence Height
 - a. 40" height aligns with CPW's wildlife standards but is on the lower end for dog park standards.
 - b. In this area, the fence height may be determined by Eagle Ranch PUD codes.
 - c. 48" is the minimum height set by many municipalities, but 42" might be the maximum height allowed.
 - i. *Given the PUD constraints, are there design considerations the committee recommends to maximize dog containment and safety at this height?*

Community Input:

March 11th 2025 Council Meeting - MOTION: Council Member Geoffrey Grimmer motioned to approve the proposed fencing plans at the Eagle Dog Park. The motion was seconded and with a vote of 7 in favor (Kerst, Turnipseed, Bodenhemier, Grimmer, Sunday, Woodworth Foral, and Woods) and 0 opposed.

Budget/ Staff Impact:

Based on current market pricing, staff estimates that a dowel-rail fence with welded-wire mesh would cost approximately \$15 per linear foot, including materials and installation. For a perimeter of roughly 1,400 linear feet, the total fence cost is expected to fall in the range of \$25,000–\$30,000, with an additional ~\$7,500 for air-lock and vehicle gates. This puts the full project comfortably within the allocated ~\$45,000 Sales Tax Capital Improvement Fund budget.

Staff anticipates that:

- Construction costs will constitute the primary expenditure associated with this project.
- Ongoing operational costs will be minimal and limited to routine spot repairs, replacement of damaged rails or posts, and upkeep of hardware and signage.

- There is no expected change to the Open Space & Trails annual operating budget as a result of constructing the fence.
- Staff capacity impacts are limited to coordinating design, installation, and contractor oversight. No new staffing or ongoing labor commitments are anticipated.

Staff confirms that the project is achievable within the scheduled 2026 work plan and aligns with available departmental resources.

Strategic Plan(s) Alignment:

Action item 3.12 from the Elevate Eagle Comprehensive Plan includes the following:

- **3.12** - Pursue funding for park maintenance and enhancement and for the construction of new parks including dog parks.

Recommend Action or Proposed Motion:

Staff requests that OSRAC review the design considerations outlined in this memo and provide guidance on the preferred approach to fencing materials, height limitations, gate design, and optional features such as air-locks or future small-dog areas. No formal motion is requested, as Town Council has already directed staff to move forward with planning and design for the dog park fence. Instead, staff is seeking the committee's expertise and input to help refine the concept before developing final plans and contacting contractors.

Alex Smiley,

I am writing to express my support for the effort to add additional fencing at the Town of Eagle Dog Park. I have been an Animal Services Officer with Eagle County for over seven years. Our department is contracted to provide domestic pet animal ordinance enforcement for the Town of Eagle as well in order to reduce the workload of the Eagle Police Department and allow their officers to focus on human law enforcement. I am also a resident of the town and a dog owner myself. My dog, Crowley, and I spend quite a bit of time at the dog park, both on and off duty.

As the Town of Eagle has a blanket physical control requirement (commonly called a “leash law”) that applies in every area of the town, the dog park is the only publicly-accessible place where dogs can run and play off-leash. This is an invaluable resource for dog owners who do not have their own yards, such as those living in apartments or townhomes like myself, or dog owners who simply want to give their dogs the opportunity to play and socialize with other dogs. Socialization has been increasingly recognized as a core component of an animal’s well-being and is widely considered to be just as necessary to their quality of life as food, water, and shelter.

Our department also helps assist Eagle County Open Space and Colorado Parks and Wildlife in attempting to reduce conflict between dogs and elk, especially in the Eagle Ranch area during the winter months. Our current signage at the dog park states that if the elk are present, then the dog park is closed. We have received pushback about this. The first point I’ve heard is that if the only public dog park in town is closed, where can people go to exercise their dogs, especially high energy ones that cannot receive adequate exercise on a leashed walk? At this time, the only recommendation I can give to people is to drive out of town to another dog park. I cannot recommend any of the county open spaces surrounding Eagle for the same reason - the elk are there. The other argument I’ve heard is from people asking me to define the boundary that elk must cross to be considered “close enough” to close the dog park.

Additionally, we cannot expect every person and dog to be perfect 100% of the time. Even the best-trained dog can get spooked and run farther than it should. A person with a new dog may have trained their dog’s recall ability to perfection in an enclosed area, but an environment with new sights, sounds, smells, and other dogs and people around, provides plenty of distractions that could set that training back a bit. I was called to just that situation one winter at the Eagle

dog park - a family had taken their new dog, Charlie, to the dog park and he quickly became overwhelmed. He would not let anyone get close to him and kept trying to bolt out onto Sylvan Lake Rd. I spent about two hours chasing Charlie away from the road and back into the park before he got tired enough that his family was able to collect him. If the park was fenced, situations like this could be more easily avoided. Spooked dogs would not be in danger of running into traffic and getting them back under control would be much easier.

We often receive requests from people in the Eagle Ranch neighborhood asking the Animal Services Officers to spend more time in the area enforcing the leash laws, but that is simply not possible. We only have three officers and one manager to cover the entire county 12 hours per day, 7 days per week. As much as we know that we need more presence in the area, we simply do not have enough people to dedicate all of our time and resources to one neighborhood out of the entire county.

I believe that additional fencing at the dog park would help mitigate these issues. Having a fence would create a defined boundary to tell people what space is available for them and their dogs to utilize, regardless of season. Even if the elk were bedding down in the open space north or east of the area that is generally considered to be part of the dog park, having that physical barrier would still allow for dogs to use that space while preventing them from accessing the elk. It would maintain the availability of a public off-leash area for dogs. It would provide an extra layer of security for the dog park and help make it a safer space for people, dogs, and wildlife.

Agenda Item: OSRAC Roles and Bylaws

Request:

Staff requests OSRAC discussion and direction on Committee roles, expectations, and responsibilities based on a review of the OSRAC bylaws, and relevant town code.

Background:

During the November OSRAC meeting, members expressed interest in reviewing the committee's bylaws to clarify roles and responsibilities. Consideration of this committee's purpose is important at this time in light of upcoming decisions around e-bike usage and new trail proposals. A review is timely, as clarity around advisory responsibilities, procedural expectations, and committee authority will help ensure effective and aligned decision-making.

Analysis:

Staff recommends that OSRAC review the current bylaws focusing on the Officers, Authority and Duties, and Meetings sections. The goal is to reaffirm the advisory role of OSRAC, identify any procedural questions or ambiguities, and improve the effectiveness of future meetings.

Officers:

- A. **Chair.** The Committee shall be led by a Chair, who shall be elected by the voting members of the Committee at the Committee's first meeting of each calendar year. The Chair shall be responsible for scheduling and leading the Committee meetings and activities.
 - Current Chair, Ernest Saeger
- B. **Other Officers.** The Committee shall elect a **Secretary** at the same time and in the same manner as it elects a Chair. The Committee may elect a **Vice-Chair** through the same method, who shall assume the duties of the Chair in the Chair's absence. All officer appointments shall be for a 2-year period.
 - Vice Chair, Jessica Foulis
 - Secretary, Philip Kirkman
- C. **Committee Coordinator.** The Committee shall appoint one of its voting members as the Committee Coordinator, who shall act as a liaison between the Committee, the Town Council,

and Town Manager. The Chair, Secretary or Vice-Chair may serve concurrently in the role of Committee Coordinator.

- Committee Coordinator: Ellen Bodenhemier.

Relevant Municipal Code Review

Section 6.04.010 outlines how the public may propose new trails or allowed-use changes. This is the current policy that will guide discussion around e-bike policy changes and new trail development proposals.

Section 6.04.010. - Proposal procedure.

Members of the public and recreation user groups who wish to propose a new trail or change the allowed uses on a trail shall request a pre-application meeting with the Town's open space coordinator. The open space coordinator shall determine the extent of the information and application materials needed based on the nature of the proposal. The open space coordinator will then schedule a public hearing with the Town Council to review the proposal. The Town Council shall review the proposal at a public hearing which shall be advertised for a minimum of 15 days prior to the date of the hearing. In addition, property owners within 250 feet of any new trail segment (if applicable) or trail with a proposed change in use shall be sent notice of such hearing by first class mail. Notice of the hearing shall be published in the Town's newspaper of record. At the said hearing, the Town Council shall have the authority to take final action on the proposed construction of a new trail or change in existing trails allowed uses.

Discussion:

To support effective and aligned OSRAC meetings in 2026, staff is seeking committee input on two focused topics. The purpose of this discussion is to clarify expectations and gather direction to help staff prioritize agenda items and work planning for the coming year. This discussion is not intended to revise the bylaws, but rather to clarify shared understanding heading into 2026.

1. Committee Roles, Expectations, and Officer Functioning

Staff is seeking input on how well OSRAC's roles and officer responsibilities are understood and functioning.

Questions for OSRAC:

- Does the committee feel its advisory role is clearly understood by members, Council, and the public?
- Are the current officer roles and meeting functions helping OSRAC operate effectively, or are there areas staff can support more clearly?
- Are there any areas where staff can be more supportive to improve flow or effectiveness of meetings?

2. Role within Trail Proposal & Allowed-Use Processes

Town Code Section 6.04.010 outlines the required steps for public trail proposals and allowed-use changes, culminating in a public hearing before Town Council. Staff is seeking input on how OSRAC wishes to be incorporated into this process.

Questions for OSRAC:

- Where in the existing process would OSRAC like to provide an advisory review?
- Would a standardized evaluation framework be helpful?

Future Item: Engagement with guiding documents

Members expressed interest in reviewing the Open Space and Trails Master Plan and related Management Plans. This review will help guide future discussions around project prioritization. Staff will bring this topic back in early 2026 to discuss how OSRAC would like to incorporate plan recommendations into future work planning. At your leisure, please review **Chapter 3: Recommendations** of the 2022 Open Space and Trails Master Plan and the **Resource Management** sections of the management plans. TOWN OF EAGLE OPEN SPACE AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE (OSRAC) BYLAWS
AS ADOPTED in January 2021 and UPDATED in September 2023.

ARTICLE I. PURPOSE.

The purpose of the Town of Eagle Open Space and Recreation Advisory Committee (the "Committee") is to provide additional expertise to the Town Council and the Town Manager necessary to enhance and facilitate open space and recreation in the Town, and to act as a conduit between the Town, residents, relevant stakeholders, and the broader community to expand and improve the Town's internal and adjacent open space and recreation opportunities within the context of the Town's commitment to conservation, social, and environmental objectives.

ARTICLE II. MEMBERS.

A. Number; Term. The Committee shall consist of not more than 7 voting members appointed by the Town Council to 4-year terms, and an alternate member appointed to a 4-year term who may act as a voting member in the absence of a regular voting member. Other non-voting members of the Committee shall consist of a Trustee, the Town Manager or designee and other appropriate Town staff. Voting members of the Committee shall be residents of the Town, own real property or own a business within the Town or employed within the Town limits in order to be eligible for appointment. Voting members may be reappointed by the Town Council but shall serve no more than 2 successive 4-year terms.

B. Application; Appointment. The Town Manager shall establish an application process for prospective Committee members, including public notice. The Town Manager shall then present a list of candidates to the Town Council from qualified applicants. The Town Council may interview some or all of the applicants and may consider recommendations made by current Committee members. The Town Council shall then vote on the appointment of members by written ballot, with such ballots being tallied by the Town Clerk, followed by a motion to appoint the highest vote-getters and a voice vote on that motion. The written ballots shall include the

name of the person voting and shall be public records, as required by the Colorado Open Records Act, C.R.S. § 24-72-200.1, *et seq.*

C. Removal. Committee members may be removed by a majority vote of the Town Council for neglect of duty, conflict of interest or malfeasance in office, after notice and an opportunity to be heard.

D. Vacancies. Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as appointments.

ARTICLE III. OFFICERS.

A. Chair. The Committee shall be led by a Chair, who shall be elected by the voting members of the Committee at the Committee's first meeting of each calendar year. The Chair shall be responsible for scheduling and leading the Committee meetings and activities.

B. Other Officers. The Committee shall elect a Secretary at the same time and in the same manner as it elects a Chair. The Committee may elect a Vice-Chair through the same method, who shall assume the duties of the Chair in the Chair's absence. All officer appointments shall be for a 2-year period.

C. Committee Coordinator. The Committee shall appoint one of its voting members as the Committee Coordinator, who shall act as a liaison between the Committee, the Town Council, and Town Manager. The Chair, Secretary or Vice-Chair may serve concurrently in the role of Committee Coordinator.

ARTICLE IV. AUTHORITY AND DUTIES.

A. Authority. The Committee is authorized to take any of the following actions, consistent with its purpose:

1. Make recommendations to the Town Council regarding open space acquisition, conservation, and recreation programs in line with stated priorities in the Town Comprehensive Plan and adopted Strategic Plan of the Town Council;
2. Promote open space conservation and stewardship in the Town; and
3. Encourage recreation which provides responsible use of open spaces in ways that conserve the land and provide for ongoing quality of life for current and future residents of Eagle.

B. Duties. In exercising its Authority, the Committee shall perform the following duties:

1. Present an annual written report to the Town Council on the ongoing projects under review by the Committee as well as a proposed budget of any funds allocated to the Committee;
2. Provide input to the Town Manager regarding provisions of the Town's Building Code or Land Use Code which may hinder open space conservation and recreation;

3. Formulate and evaluate new open space recreation strategies and policies in furtherance of the environmental and quality of life goals adopted by the Town Council;
 4. Review planned open space, recreation, and development proposals in the Town, upon request by the Town Manager; and
 5. Perform any other activities related to open space management that could promote a positive environmental and recreational capacity for the Town or will help with the implementation of the Town's environmental and strategic plan, as assigned by the Town Council or Town Manager.
- C. Quorum. Four (4) members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum for any official action, but, in the absence of a quorum, a lesser number may continue any meeting or hearing to a later time or date, and in the absence of all members, Town staff may adjourn any meeting.

ARTICLE V. PARTNER ORGANIZATIONS.

To encourage collaboration, the Committee shall have partner organizations or subject-matter experts whose representatives may also participate in Committee meetings in a non-voting, advisory manner. There shall be no limit to the number of partner organizations or subject-matter experts invited to attend and participate in the Committee's meetings.

ARTICLE VI. MEETINGS.

A. Public Meetings. All Committee meetings shall be open to the public, and noticed as required by the Colorado Open Meetings Law, C.R.S. § 24-6-401, *et seq.* Upcoming agendas shall be posted on the Town's website.

B. Regular Meetings. Regular meetings shall be held monthly at the Eagle Town Hall, unless determined by a majority vote of the Committee as necessary and appropriate to meet at another location. The Chair may cancel any regular meeting when there is no business to be conducted by the Committee.

C. Special Meetings. Special meetings may be called by the Chair or upon written request of 3 members of the Committee filed with the Secretary. The purpose of the meeting shall be stated at the time of the request.

D. Minutes. Action minutes shall be kept for all Committee meetings. Approved minutes shall be posted on the Town's website.

E. Quorum. A majority of the total number of members then holding office shall constitute a quorum of the Committee for purposes of conducting business, and a majority vote of those present shall be necessary to carry any proposition.

ARTICLE VII. EXPENSES.

A. Staff Assistance. The Town Manager will make available to the Committee adequate facilities, staff assistance and discretionary funds to assist with the administrative functions and expenses of the Committee.

B. Budget. Upon request of the Committee, the Town Council may budget a portion of funds for administrative costs and other goals aligned with the direction from Town Council associated with the Committee's duties or meetings. The Committee Coordinator shall work with the Town Manager as needed to propose a Committee budget to the Town Council in a similar format as other Town Departments. Use of funds budgeted for the Committee may be reviewed and discussed by the Committee and proposed to Town staff as a recommendation by the Committee regarding budgeting or use of such funds.

ARTICLE VIII. AMENDMENTS.

These Bylaws may be amended by resolution of the Town Council in its sole discretion.

ARTICLE IX. SEVERABILITY.

If any part, section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of these Bylaws is for any reason held to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions.

ARTICLE X. DISSOLUTION.

The Committee may be dissolved by resolution of the Town Council in its sole discretion.
